

## CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



### **A Solemn Obligation**

As we approach Memorial Day this year, let us be mindful of our obligations as Veterans to the Fallen. For many in the United States, Memorial Day is a day off from school and work when you can enjoy the warm weather and spend time with family. For those who have served, however, Memorial Day means much more.

Marines have served our country in every conflict, small and large, for over 200 years. Their blood was shed all over this world in the name of freedom. For the most part, the Fallen tended to be young. Many of them fell before they could meet that special girl, before they could be married and before they became fathers. So who will mourn for those without issue? Naturally, it is the obligation of every nephew and niece of those lost to honor their memory and that obligation continues from one generation to the next. Unfortunately, many family members lose interest in the memory of their uncle or great uncle once their elderly family members pass.

So who is left to honor the Fallen? That, Marines, is our obligation. We who served and survived must honor the Fallen. What is the price of freedom or peace? In the midst of our current challenges we face with regards to the Coronavirus we often lose sight of the amount of sacrifice this country has made.

I once had the opportunity to visit the National World War II Museum in New Orleans. They had a wonderful exhibit on D-Day in France. The path through the museum then led you to go around the corner where another exhibit waited. This exhibit was entitled, "The Other D-Days in the Pacific." And on this wall was an account of all of the KIAs from all of the amphibious assaults in the Pacific theater. There were more than 100 "D-Days" in the East and the casualties were staggering. The war in the Pacific was truly a fight to the death. The designer of the museum exhibits clearly wanted you to see a dramatic comparison and I have never forgotten it.

It is our duty to remember our fallen heroes from all of our conflicts and honor their memories this and each Memorial Day. We also have an obligation to make sure the celebration of Memorial Day is carried outside of our relatively small community of Veterans and Gold Star families and shared with the general public.



## MARINE CORPS HISTORICAL EVENTS



On May 9<sup>th</sup> in 1942, a United States Coast Guard cutter sinks a German submarine just off the coast of North Carolina. Dozens of Germans are captured.

Yes, you read that correctly. A German submarine was patrolling the east coast of the United States during the early months of World War II. The Germans captured that day were the first foreign prisoners of war to be held on American soil since the War of 1812. Trouble began on the afternoon of May 9.

U.S.C.G. Icarus was then traveling from Staten Island, New York, to Key West, Florida. She was equipped with relatively obsolete sound detection gear. Nevertheless, at about 4:20 p.m., she picked up a “mushy” sound contact off her port bow.

A few minutes later, an explosion rocked the water. German submarine U-352 was lurking just below the surface. Its commander, Kapitänleutnant Hellmut Rathke, at first thought he’d struck the American ship. But he hadn’t.

Rathke took his submarine down, hoping to hide, but the water was only 120 feet deep—and Icarus’s commander, U.S. Coast Guard Lt. Maurice Jester, wasn’t messing around! By then, Icarus had picked up propeller noises. Jester turned Icarus toward the Germans before ordering five depth-charges dropped in a diamond pattern. More depth charges followed. Jester was following U-352’s sonar trail.

Explosions from the depth-charges wreaked havoc below. The German submarine was rocked violently, killing at least one crew member. Rathke apparently came to the conclusion that his vessel was too damaged to survive, so he brought U-352 to the surface: The German crew was ordered to abandon ship.

Rathke would later bemoan the fact that his men were fired upon as his submarine surfaced and his men came spilling out of the conning tower—but Americans didn’t know what was coming! Were the submarine’s deck guns functional?

U-352 couldn’t stay afloat for more than a few minutes. As it sank out of sight, Icarus could still make out propeller noises, so Jester ordered one last charge dropped. A huge air bubble rose to the surface, then all noises ceased. The submarine was gone. Jester turned Icarus to leave.


The Germans in the water couldn't believe it. Americans had shot at them as they abandoned ship and now they were being left to drown? But Jester had other problems on his hands: He didn't know if more German submarines were in the area, and he didn't know if he was authorized to take Germans aboard his cutter.

Jester radioed for guidance, finally receiving an answer half an hour later. Icarus was to turn around and retrieve the survivors from the water.

In the end, Icarus returned to shore with 32 prisoners of war. Several crew had gone down with the German submarine. Others died in the water. One man died of his wounds after he was pulled aboard the American ship.

The Germans would remain POWs for the duration of the war. The attached watercolor was done by Rathke during his time at Fort Bragg. It depicts U-352's final moments.

## MARINE CORPS HISTORICAL EVENTS



During this week in 1945, a United States Navy hospital corpsman engages in an action that would earn him the Medal of Honor. William David Halyburton was a North Carolina native who had once planned to serve as a minister.

In fact, Halyburton had gone so far as to enroll in Davidson College, where he planned to complete his studies. But then all his plans got put on hold. He joined the Navy in August 1943, just two days after his 19th birthday.

By the time Halyburton left for the Pacific in December 1944, he was a Pharmacist's Mate Second Class. On May 10, 1945, he was serving with a Marine Rifle Company at Okinawa. The Marines were pushing back against an intense attack. Unfortunately, as Halyburton's Medal citation describes, the Japanese were shooting down our Marines with "deadly accuracy." Halyburton was undeterred. Those Marines needed help, and he intended to give it to them.

He dashed across an open field amidst "a terrific concentration of mortar, machinegun and sniper fire," and he made it to the wounded Marine who was farthest away. He was administering first aid when his patient was hit yet again by another Japanese bullet. Halyburton promptly used his body to shield the fallen Marine from the shrapnel and bullets that were flying everywhere. He continued on with his first aid, refusing to leave his patient.

Unfortunately, Halyburton took a hit while he was working to save the wounded Marine. The wound was mortal.

Think about it. As Halyburton set off across that field, he couldn't have known whether the Marine was already too wounded to survive. He put his life on the line anyway, hoping it would be enough to save the Marine. And he went after the Marine who was farthest away and hardest to save. Brave. Selfless. Heroic.

One of Halyburton's high school classmates would later speak of the boy he'd known: "Billy Halyburton was one of a kind. . . . He was a man, all right, but he was still a compassionate, caring individual who belied his wartime status. Billy was one of those who truly believed in caring for his fellow man. That was his duty, that was his outlook, that was his way of life."

## CAPITAL CITY YOUNG MARINES



Semper Fi fellow War Dogs!

I recently took over XO for Capital City a few months ago and I'm very excited to lead our Young Marines into a new era! About myself, I enlisted in our beloved Corps from 2005-2013 as a 3521 Motor Transport Mechanic and 8159 Marine Security Guard. I have multiple combat deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan and served three years in embassy duty at US embassies in Nigeria, Belgium, and El Salvador. I was lucky to serve in a multitude of billets and experience a lot of opportunities to lead and train fellow Marines. Currently, I am a Durham city police officer and I am working on completing my Bachelor's degree in Leadership at the University of Mount Olive.

Now, about our Young Marines. While COVID 19 has created some issues for our Young Marines to gather and train, we are overcoming, adapting, and resisting its talons. Right now we expecting to cancel a majority of the remaining training events for the year due to the Governor's stay at home order. To combat this, we are conducting weekly Zoom meetings to still provide training and foster camaraderie. Once this order has lifted, we will resume in-person meetings and redetermine what other events we are able to complete.

Our Young Marine NCOs (YM/NCOs) are taking the lead by hosting each Zoom meeting. Each squad leader hosts an individual Zoom meeting and provides leadership training to their junior Young Marines. The platoon sergeant, YM/Cpl Alcantara, and unit gunnery sergeant, YM/GySgt Gorlesky, attend each squad meeting and provide additional support to our young squad leaders. Myself and Andy, the Unit Commander, host another weekly meeting with the YM/NCOs. During this meeting, the YM/NCOs inform us of current issues, solutions, and their needs. I then provide them some leadership training directly from Marine Corps material such as the handbook for Marine NCOs, Corporal's and Sergeant's Course materials, Marine Corps publications, and more. Our most recent training covered an article titled "Brilliance in the Basics" by Marine LtCol McCoy and how we can apply those principles to them as Young Marines.

Moving forward. Expect to see our Young Marine leaders taking more charge of the unit and engaging in more confidence-building activities. We are shifting from what was once a mostly “adult-driven” unit to a “Young Marine-driven” unit just like how NCOs run the Corps. We are expecting the Young Marines to perform at least 75% of the work (planning, creating, and perform events, yearly schedules, etc.) while the adults' transition to working only 25% of the time doing only things that the Young Marines are unable to have access to or unable to conduct.
